The book of Revelation

2:12-17

Welcome to the weekly verse-by-verse bible study in the book of Revelation. Make sure you pray before you start this, or any bible study.

Note: all scripture is from the NKJV unless otherwise noted.

Two weeks ago, we began chapter 2 looking and the first letter to the church in Ephesus, and last week the second letter to the church in Smyrna.

This week we will look at the third letter to the church in Pergamos.

May 2:12-17 "And to the angel of the church in Pergamos write,

'These things says He who has the sharp two-edged sword: I know your works, and where you dwell, where Satan's throne is. And you hold fast to My name, and did not deny My faith even in the days in which Antipas was My faithful martyr, who was killed among you, where Satan dwells. But I have a few things against you, because you have there those who hold the doctrine of Balaam, who taught Balak to put a stumbling block before the children of Israel, to eat things sacrificed to idols, and to commit sexual immorality. Thus you also have those who hold the doctrine of the Nicolaitans, which thing I hate. 'Repent, or else I will come to you quickly and will fight against them with the sword of My mouth. He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches. To him who overcomes I will give some of the hidden manna to eat. And I will give him a white stone, and on the stone a new name written which no one knows except him who receives it.''

Here in the third letter to the church in Pergamos, we read of something that was told to the other two churches. "I know your works". In fact, if you read the letters to all seven churches, they all say this same thing "I know your works". As we read about each church, they are all different, but they are all doing (works).

Today, it seems that the church places so much emphasis on the things that we are doing, that we seem to forget why, or for Whom we are doing them.

Just like we read in the letter to the first church, Ephesus:

Properties Rev 2:4 Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your first love.

As we read with the church in Ephesus, they were doing a lot, but not from their heart, it was more of a duty to them. Nevertheless even though all the churches were doing, and some of the people were in sin, Jesus wanted to address those sins and also give words of encouragement for those who would overcome and to those who were not sin.

So looking at this third letter to the church in Pergamos, Jesus says:

And to the angel of the church in Pergamos write, 'These things says He who has the sharp two-edged sword:

So a little about Pergamos.

Pergamos was about 15 miles inland and was a city of Mysia in the Caicus valley. This city was also known for emperor worship with a temple built to Rome and Augustus in 29 B.C. They also built temples to, and worshiped the false gods Asklepios and Zeus. The symbol of Asklepios was a serpent. Zeus was also known as "Zeus the savior" in this city.

Also if you will remember from our study to the church in Ephesus, when you read "**To** the angel of the church" this is referring to the pastor of the church.

These things says He who has the sharp two-edged sword

"He who has the sharp two-edged sword" This is referring to John's description of Jesus in chapter one.

Provided Rev 1:16 He had in His right hand seven stars, out of His mouth went a sharp two-edged sword, and His countenance was like the sun shining in its strength.

"I have read these two-edged sword things in the bible before. But what does it really mean?" you may be wondering.

Matthew Henry's commentary explains it as:

The word of God is a sword; it is a weapon both offensive and defensive, it is, in the hand of God, able to slay both sin and sinners.

It is a sword with two edges; it turns and cuts every way. There is the edge of the law against the transgressors of that dispensation, and the edge of the gospel against the despisers of that dispensation; there is an edge to make a wound, and an edge to open a festered wound in order to its healing. There is no escaping the edge of this sword: if you turn aside to the right hand, it has an edge on that side; if on the left hand, you fall upon the edge of the sword on that side; it turns every way.

The bible also explains it as:

Heb 4:12 For the word of God is living and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the division of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart.

Think of a sword for a minute. There are hundreds of different types of swords, depending upon the country and person that uses them. Some have a blade on one edge, like a Samurai's sword. Where as others have a blade on both sides like those of a Roman soldier. Each served its purpose, and each did its job well in the hands of a master swordsman.

But here in the bible, the sword is referred to as the word of God. So how could such a destructive thing be associated with the word of God? First off, God is not against war, as you read throughout the Old Testament. The purpose of war was to rid the land of sin, and if it weren't destroyed, it would infect the lives of the children of Israel just like a cancer in a healthy body.

This is what sin does to us in our lives. We could be going along just fine, when all of a sudden, out of nowhere, sin attacks us, and unless we battle this sin and destroy it, it will infect our lives. But we of our own selves cannot destroy sin, because this is not a physical battle but rather a spiritual battle, just as Paul told the Ephesians.

₱ Eph 6:12 For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places.

This is the verse which precedes Paul talking about the Armor of God. Yet, we always think we know how to use God's word, but the question is, do we really? Just because you watch shows on TV or a movie with guys using a sword does not make you a master swordsman. No, you must pick up a sword, and start practicing with it, and even taking lessons from a master swordsman. If you don't, then the first time you try to use it in a real battle, you will die, because you are going against a trained, seasoned swordsman.

It's the same way with the word of God as we use it in our daily battles against sin. You can read the bible all you want, but unless you apply it to your life, it means nothing. I think I used this illustration before, but it fits here just as well.

Let's say I want a chocolate cake. So I have all the ingredients, the flour, sugar, milk, eggs, coco, etc and even a cookbook telling me how to make this cake. I can read the cookbook all I want, but unless I do what it says, (mix the ingredients together, and pour it into a pan, and cook it for so many minutes at the right temperature) I will never have my chocolate cake.

James gives us another illustration of this.

† James 1:23-24 For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man observing his natural face in a mirror; for he observes himself, goes away, and immediately forgets what kind of man he was.

You can look in the mirror all you want, but unless you look for those little imperfections (which we all do when we look in a mirror) and take care of them, we will walk away looking the same, blackheads and all.

So once again, the word of God is like a sword, and in the hand of a master it will defeat the enemy and protect us from the attacks of the enemy. Now the enemy may hit us several times with different blows (sins) in the same day, but as you study and live the word of God, you to will become a master swordsman.

If you want an example of the master in action, then read Matthew 4:1-11 and Luke 4:1-13 and you can read of the ultimate Master of God's word, Jesus.

But also notice what it says at the end of Luke 4:13 after Jesus was tempted by the devil.

† Luke 4:13 Now when the devil had ended every temptation, he departed from Him until an opportune time.

Jesus won that battle, but that didn't stop the devil from coming back later and trying again. Just because you overcome a temptation does not mean that you are in the clear for the rest of your life, because we need to: *Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour.* 1 Peter 5:8 And you can be sure that he will return again to tempt you. We must also remember that the sword (the word of God) is not used to destroy us, but rather to destroy the sin in our lives.

Jesus goes on to tell the church of Pergamos:

I know your works, and where you dwell, where Satan's throne is. And you hold fast to My name, and did not deny My faith even in the days in which Antipas was My faithful martyr, who was killed among you, where Satan dwells.

In Pergamos, there was a false healing god known as Exculapius who was worshipped in the form of a serpent, which is one of the names of satan.

Property Rev 12:9 So the great dragon was cast out, that serpent of old, called the Devil and Satan, who deceives the whole world; he was cast to the earth, and his angels were cast out with him.

Also, as mentioned before, here in Pergamos there was Emperor worship, where incense was offered before the statue of the Emperor, as to a god. If the Christians would refuse to worship this false idol then they were put to death. Yet, here in Pergamos, the Christians were holding onto the name of Jesus and many died because they did, and one is mentioned by name, Antipas. There is little known about him other then he was a Martyr for Jesus Christ.

Also, don't confuse the fact that Jesus mentions the throne of satan and the church as being one and the same.

I know your works, and where you dwell, where Satan's throne is

When you read that you may be thinking that this throne of satan is in the church. But, that's not what is being said here, but rather the throne of satan was in the city and not in the church. Here in Pergamos, the church was in one place and this temple to this false god was in another place. The question is, were people attending both the church and this temple? But then that's not only a question for the church in Pergamos, but for us today as well.

A lot of people think that they can go out on Friday and Saturday night and party hardy, then go to church on Sunday (hangover and all) and get cleansed from their sins. But as we will read to the church in Laodicea who lived a double life, Jesus says:

Rev 3:16 So then, because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will vomit you out of My mouth.

Jesus also said:

₱ Matt 6:24 No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be loyal to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon.

Yet so many Christians try to serve God and their flesh at the same time, and most end up backsliding and/or walking away from the Lord because they do.

Jesus goes on to say to the church in Pergamos something that none of us would ever want to hear Jesus say to us, "But I have a few things against you".

But I have a few things against you, because you have there those who hold the doctrine of Balaam, who taught Balak to put a stumbling block before the children of Israel, to eat things sacrificed to idols, and to commit sexual immorality.

If you read the book of Numbers starting in chapter 22, there you will find the entire story about Balaam and Balak. But here are two main verses that give us a quick overview of how Balaam affected the children of Israel.

Num 25:1-3 Now Israel remained in Acacia Grove, and the people began to commit harlotry with the women of Moab. They invited the people to the sacrifices of their gods, and the people ate and bowed down to their gods. So Israel was joined to Baal of Peor, and the anger of the LORD was aroused against Israel.

Num 31:16 Look, these women caused the children of Israel, through the counsel of Balaam, to trespass against the LORD in the incident of Peor, and there was a plague among the congregation of the LORD.

Today, Balaam would say things to us like:

- (a) "Go ahead and do it, God will forgive you."
- (a) "But it's ok, because that was hundreds of years ago and things have changed."
- (a) "God didn't really mean that."
- © "Everyone else is doing it, why not go ahead and do it to."
- (i) "It's a new way to worship."
- (a) "We need more then just the bible; we also need this companion book to help us understand what God is saying."

How many of these have you heard in the church, or by so called believers? Unfortunately guys are good at using some of these to get women into bed with them. Some people will use them to get others to leave the church they are going to and join their church. But every one of these statements is 100% false and unbiblical. When you use them or any statement that is contrary to the bible, you are putting a stumbling block before others.

Here are a few more examples:

- *⊕ Mother nature:*
 - God is not a woman, and God is our Father, not our mother.
 - Romans 1:7 To all who are in Rome, beloved of God, called to be saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.
- © God helps those who help themselves:
 You will NOT find this phrase in the bible, nor it's teaching. In fact, the bible teaches us the opposite and that apart from Jesus we can do nothing, therefore, how could we help ourselves? If we can help ourselves, then why would we even need God?
 - **John 15:5** *I* am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing.
- © *Fight fire with fire:*
 - I'll let Jesus answer this one.
 - ₱ Matt 12:25-26 (NLT) Jesus knew their thoughts and replied, "Any kingdom at war with itself is doomed. A city or home divided against itself is doomed. And if Satan is casting out Satan, he is fighting against himself. His own kingdom will not survive."

You don't fight against sin with sin. As we learned earlier, you fight sin with the word of God, period.

- ∃ Jude 1:9 Yet Michael the archangel, in contending with the devil, when
 he disputed about the body of Moses, dared not bring against him a
 reviling accusation, but said, "The Lord rebuke you!"
- → Matthew 4:7 Jesus said to him, "It is written again, 'You shall not tempt
 the LORD your God."

One more, that really gets on my nerves.

- ① The big guy, or the man upstairs:
 No, God is not the Big Guy, or the Man Upstairs, when you say things like that,
 you are trying to bring God down, waaaay down to your level. But you can't, and
 shouldn't even attempt to, because **HE IS GOD!** So don't be ashamed to speak it
 out or to speak the name of Jesus.
 - † Luke 9:26 For whoever is ashamed of Me and My words, of him the Son of Man will be ashamed when He comes in His own glory, and in His Father's, and of the holy angels.
 - Deuteronomy 32:3 For I proclaim the name of the LORD: Ascribe greatness to our God.

So just a warning to watch what you say or quote, just because you hear it all the time, even in the church, does not mean it's in the bible, and if it's contrary to the bible, you are putting a stumbling block before others. Also, don't sign God's name to some saying that you think is cool, if it's not a quote from the bible, then God didn't say it, you did.

Jesus goes on to say that: Thus you also have those who hold the doctrine of the Nicolaitans, which thing I hate.

Peter writes about these false teachers, who were called the *Nicolaitans*:

Peter 2:12-19 But these, like natural brute beasts made to be caught and destroyed, speak evil of the things they do not understand, and will utterly perish in their own corruption, and will receive the wages of unrighteousness, as those who count it pleasure to carouse in the daytime. They are spots and blemishes, carousing in their own deceptions while they feast with you, having eyes full of adultery and that cannot cease from sin, enticing unstable souls. They have a heart trained in covetous practices, and are accursed children. They have forsaken the right way and gone astray, following the way of Balaam the son of Beor, who loved the wages of unrighteousness; but he was rebuked for his iniquity: a dumb donkey speaking with a man's voice restrained the

madness of the prophet. These are wells without water, clouds carried by a tempest, for whom is reserved the blackness of darkness forever.

For when they speak great swelling words of emptiness, they allure through the lusts of the flesh, through lewdness, the ones who have actually escaped from those who live in error. While they promise them liberty, they themselves are slaves of corruption; for by whom a person is overcome, by him also he is brought into bondage.

Jesus has a word of warning for those who are doing these things in verse 16.

Repent, or else I will come to you quickly and will fight against them with the sword of My mouth.

"There's that "R" word again. Can't we come up with something better then that?"

Oh, you mean the word "*Repent*"? Did you know that it is one of the first things that Jesus preached.

₱ Matt 4:17 From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, ''Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.''

As we know, the word repent means to turn from your sin. Many want to be saved, but they don't want to turn from their sins. They want to continue in their sins and not have to answer for them, and they think that they wont because they are "saved". These people only want fire insurance, but not a relationship with Jesus Christ.

Yet, being saved is more then just praying a prayer; it's also wanting to turn from your old life and into a new life in Jesus Christ.

Eph 4:17-24 This I say, therefore, and testify in the Lord, that you should no longer walk as the rest of the Gentiles walk, in the futility of their mind, having their understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart; who, being past feeling, have given themselves over to lewdness, to work all uncleanness with greediness. But you have not so learned Christ, if indeed you have heard Him and have been taught by Him, as the truth is in Jesus: that you put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts, and be renewed in the spirit of your mind, and that you put on the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness.

Maybe you have been out partying on the weekends and coming to church on Sunday to get cleaned up.

Maybe you have been saying and teaching things to others that are not in the bible.

Maybe you are living in sin with a man or a woman, or maybe you are not living together, but are in sexual sin with him or her or multiple people.

Maybe you are not involved in any of these things, but you know that they are happening in your church and you just sit back and let them continue.

What if you found out that your friend has cancer and they didn't know it, would you just sit back and watch them die, or would you tell them and help them to get the help that they need? Of course you would tell them and help them. So, why then are you allowing this cancer (sin) to continue in the church?

Or maybe are you being a cancer in the church with your lifestyle?

Are you waiting for everyone to get infected with your sin or just accept it so that you can continue in it?

Jesus says to all these things: Repent, or else I will come to you quickly and will fight against them with the sword of My mouth.

If the devil couldn't overcome the word of God, do you think you can? I wouldn't even want to try.

Finally, Jesus ends this letter to the church in Pergamos with:

"He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches. To him who overcomes I will give some of the hidden manna to eat. And I will give him a white stone, and on the stone a new name written which no one knows except him who receives it."

After the children of Israel entered the Promised Land, the Manna stopped coming. Imagine that, for forty years they were fed in the wilderness, then it stopped. What to do, what to do? Well, they would depend upon the new provisions that the Lord has given them, which was the Land of Milk and Honey, and all the produce of the land there.

But one day we will all, as believers, be provided for in Heaven by the Lord, and if you ever wondered what this manna tasted like, Moses described it for us in the book of Exodus.

Ex 16:31 (NLT) In time, the food became known as manna. It was white like coriander seed, and it tasted like honey cakes.

One of my favorite cakes is Angel Food cake. Will it taste like this? I don't know and we as believers will get to find out in heaven exactly what it tastes like, if we overcome. (*To him who overcomes I will give some of the hidden manna to eat.*)

"Ok, what is this white stone thing with our name on it?" you may be wondering.

White represents purity. Back in the book of Exodus, we read of the twelve tribes having their names, each engraved on a stone.

♣ Ex 28:21 (NLT) Each stone will represent one of the tribes of Israel, and the name of that tribe will be engraved on it as though it were a seal.

And these names were worn over the heart of Aaron.

⊕ Ex 28:29 So Aaron shall bear the names of the sons of Israel on the breastplate of judgment over his heart, when he goes into the holy place, as a memorial before the LORD continually.

We are seen as pure, because of what Jesus did on the cross for us. As God sees us pure, our names are close to His heart, and He will give us a new name. What will it be or represent? Only God knows, and you will also know when you receive it in heaven.
